#### AP English 11 – Language and Composition Dr. J. Spiegel Room 110



Welcome to AP English 11! This course is designed to prepare you for the Advanced Placement Language and Composition test while providing you with advanced skills valuable in the collegiate realm. This course is also a college in high school course through Seton Hill University and meets all the

requirements for those seeking college credits from this institution for this course. The attached pages provide you with a **tentative** course syllabus of some of the readings we may do, but not necessarily in that order. Specific due dates for each unit will be provided later.

## Topics to be covered

This course will focus heavily on reading, writing, and rhetoric. You will be required to read and analyze, verbally and in writing, works of fiction and nonfiction, art and graphic illustrations, and many other media. You will study rhetorical devices used by authors and analyze their effectiveness in establishing the authors' tones and delivering their messages. All novels in the course will be pieces of American Literature, while the origins of materials from our primary text, *The Language of Composition*, will be varied. ## Course Binder

You should keep all notes, handouts, and homework in your binder for each nine weeks. They will be needed for the mid-term and final exam later in the course. The mid-term and final exams are cumulative – replicating what you will experience in the college environment. These materials will also be helpful for studying for the AP exam.

## Writing

Several types of writing will be done in this course. You will write critical analysis papers, research papers, precis, journals, and short written answers to provided text questions. As per the AP test, you will also write Free Response Questions (FRQs). These will require you to 1) analyze an author's form, structure and/or tone, 2) argue a position, and 3) synthesize information from multiple sources to prove a position. Each FRQ assignment will be graded holistically using the AP Exam rubric and will be timed as per College Board standards.

## Tests and Quizzes

Tests and quizzes may be given via Canvas. When they are given in this format, YOU ARE NOT PERMITTED TO TAKE THEM ON ANY ELECTRONIC DEVICE OTHER THAN YOUR SCHOOL ISSUED IPAD. Any student who does not have a charged, district-issued iPad in class during the test will take the test/quiz on paper. Any student absent the day of the quiz or test will also take the paper make-up. Canvas will

automatically populate a 0 for your test, but do not worry. As soon as you make up your quiz on paper, I will override your score manually and without penalty. Students are not permitted to take a quiz/test anywhere or anytime other than in my classroom while being supervised by me.

#### Course Journal

You will complete monthly journal assignments for class using Canvas online. Your journals will provide your own critical analysis of pieces published in credible national newspapers. I will provide you with standard rubrics and directions that will be used for every post before your first post is due and a list of acceptable newspapers we can all access.

### Participation

This is an AP level course where your participation is expected daily. You should be prepared to present information individually, as part of a group, or in Socratic Seminar discussions. Working on other homework during class is NOT acceptable and it is expected that you will take appropriate notes each day as you would in a college course.

### Tardy To School / Early Dismissal / Field Trip

If you come to school late, leave early, or attend a field trip, you are in the school building and are expected to deliver any homework due that day to me that day or upload it to Canavs as instructed. You may also leave it in the AP English basket in my classroom or to Canavs online depending on the assignment's requirements. Feel free to ask for assignments in advance, as I am usually prepared weeks or months ahead.

#### Classroom Behavior

This is an AP level course that requires rigorous amounts of reading and writing both in and out of class and will also require speaking both formally and informally in class. Since literature is interpretive, many of you will develop opinions about the authors and works we study. Some of your opinions will be different than your classmates and that is ok. Please respect the opinions of all parties in the classroom and do not speak out of turn or interrupt others as they discuss their points of view. Everyone will be afforded the opportunity to speak in turn. In addition, please respect the following BRAVE standards of behavior:

Be safe: Listen to staff and maintain personal space.

Respect others: Be on time, be polite, and use appropriate language and tone.

Be accountable: Be prepared, be honest, do your own work, use electronic devices only when permitted.

Be victorious: Do your best work and celebrate academic success.

Be enthusiastic: Have a positive attitude and take ownership of learning.

## Grading

All grading will be done according to the district's grading scale. Each assignment will have an assigned point value. Check your grades frequently online. See the guidance office if you do not have a password.

## Homework / Assignment Standards

All work should be neatly written or typed. Use blue or black ink. All hand-written work should be completed on 8 1/2 by 11 sheets of lined paper. MLA Style must be used. 10 % will be deducted from work not meeting these standards and from any assignment that does not have the provided grading rubric. See individual assignment directions for details.

#### Late Work

All work must be completed on time. Late work will be accepted for seven days after the assignment due date with penalty. This includes work late for the following reasons: work forgotten at home or elsewhere, work not completed due to after school job, activity, or other extracurricular responsibility. Regardless of reason, the penalties are as follows:

- work worth 30 points or less will receive ½ credit.
- work worth 31 points or more will lose the point equivalent of one letter grade per day until the value is 50%.

After seven days, assignments on Canvas will close and WILL NOT be reopened. No late work will be accepted after seven days.

## Academic Integrity - Plagiarism and Cheating

It is **absolutely unacceptable** to copy material from another student or from another source (i.e.: internet sites). You are not permitted to "work together" on assignments unless I have given you specific permission to do so. If you are found plagiarizing work or cheating in any way, you and any other student (s) involved will receive a zero on the assignment, project, or test. Texting, using other electronic devices, or leaving Canvas

during an exam will also result in a zero. You will NOT have the opportunity to make up the work or do the assignment again. This includes any work produced by AI that is then claimed as your own. This includes all assignments and compositions - no exceptions. This is pursuant to the district policy. Please see the current edition of Student Handbook for more information.

In addition, please keep the following in mind:

- Accurately cite all sources.
- Accurately represent your sources.
- Read all assigned readings to assure accuracy.
- Do not copy another person's work.
- Do not give your work to others.
- Do not write a paper for one course and urn the same paper in for another course.
